Corruption: what's happening around the world?

Short description

The Corruption Perceptions Index (CPI) from Transparency International ranks 180 countries and territories around the world by their perceived levels of public sector corruption. The results are given on a scale of 0 (highly corrupt) to 100 (very clean).

Despite multiple commitments, 131 countries have made no significant progress against corruption in the last decade and in 2021, the global COVID-19 pandemic has also been used in many countries as an excuse to curtail basic freedoms and side-step important checks and balances.

Check out the latest corruption wins, scandals and predictions for each region of the world.
